


HOTEL MAP





Justice in Action: A Call to Courage with Reverend William J. Barber II

Promises Kept, Promises to Keep: Reflections on the Higher Education Act of 1965

When enacted in 1965, the landmark Higher Education Act (HEA) established the federal role in providing postsecondary opportunity. The law authorized need-based grants, workstudy opportunities, and loans to students willing to

invest in themselves. It also created outreach programs to help the most economically disadvantaged students prepare for and succeed in higher education, including the TRIO programs. In the decades since, the percentage of U.S. adults who have earned bachelor's degrees has increased by 301% (from 9% in 1965 to 38% in 2022). Despite these advances, access and completion remain a barrier for far too many students, particularly those from low-income, firstgeneration backgrounds. On the occasion of the HEA's 60th anniversary, it is important to understand why the federal commitment to postsecondary opportunity mattered in 1965 and why it matters even more now. Panelists will discuss key elements of the Act, the political and social dynamics that led to their inclusion, and the ways the HEA has transformed the higher education landscape. Panelists will also discuss the current outlook for postsecondary opportunity and what policy changes are necessary to ensure greater success for future students.
